Discuss how a director could stage the opening of
Kindertransport to engage the audience from the start. You
may refer to the direction of the performers and/or design
of the scene in your answer.

This question is worth **8 marks** so you will need to provide enough information to gain this level of credit. Each point you make needs justification which refers to the action of the extract and the characters involved.

You have been asked to respond to this question from the point of view of the director.

You have been asked to <u>discuss</u> how you would <u>engage</u> the audience so you will need to discuss your artistic intention and how you want your audience to respond. What do you want them to know? How do you want them to feel/ think?







This is the markscheme for your question. This tells you what your response should include. Read through carefully, aiming to achieve level 3. The guidance is there to help you.

## Consider!

- The scene includes a flashback within the action. Evelyn and Eva are the same person but from different time periods. How will you make that clear to the audience? What direction will you give the actors playing these role? Also think about how costume might be used here.
- At one point, the two scenes overlap each other. Faith is searching through 'memories' and Eva is preparing to leave her family. How might this be staged?
- The action takes place in an attic but includes flashbacks from Evelyn's memory. How might you adapt the space?
- How might you use foreshadowing? Faith finds a trunk and it hesitant to open it. How might you suggest that this trunk has significance in revealing the secret about her mother?
